Feedback and Peer Review



I will provide feedback on the *first* drafts of your CP and AP projects.

Your *peers* will provide feedback on the *second* drafts of your CP and AP projects. Revision is central to writing. Writers work *iteratively* — writing isn't one of those things that is 'right' the first time.

Peer review is an essential component of WR 60. It's the process by which scholars in the field publish and how managers and co-workers provide feedback.

It's important that we normalize the revision process and get comfortable with sharing our work in progress with our peers this will help all of us become better thinkers, writers, and researchers! Participation and Attendance

Conspiracy, Propaganda, and Misinformation



What are some common factors that contribute to the vulnerability of individuals in consuming misinformation online?

> What strategies or tools can individuals employ to critically evaluate the reliability of information encountered online?

How can education and media literacy play a role in combating the spread of misinformation, and what initiatives have proven effective in promoting critical thinking skills online?

> What are some key differences between conspiracy theories, propaganda, and misinformation?

How does misinformation spread on social media platforms, and what role do these platforms play in amplifying false narratives?

How has technology and the internet exacerbated the spread of misinformation, conspiracy theories, and propaganda?

Is there a discernible boundary between factual information and misinformation, or is this boundary blurrier than it seems? The goal of the readings will be to help you better understand these issues and the specific responses and solutions being proposed to ameliorate the harms caused by them especially those harms suffered by minority and/or subjugated communities.

Overall, this course will help you develop a *perspective* on these issues and show how you can critically and effectively engage this perspective through writing and research.
